

Art Dealers Association of America celebrates 60th anniversary with \$60,000 in grants to nonprofit arts organizations across the country

Six nonprofits will be awarded a one-time gift of \$10,000 to support the arts in their local communities; and the ADAA further expands their initiatives to mark this historic milestone



(September 29, 2022—New York) In celebration of its <u>60th anniversary</u>, the Art Dealers Association of America (ADAA) is pleased to announce its **60th Anniversary Grants**, a one-time award of \$10,000 to six nonprofit organizations across the United States to support the arts in their communities. The recipients are Arts of Life (Chicago, IL), Asian American Arts Alliance (Brooklyn, NY), Creative Growth (Oakland, CA), First Peoples Fund (Rapid, SD), Greetings from South-Central (Los Angeles, CA), and Project Row Houses (Houston, TX).

Chosen for their commitment to transforming access to the arts in their regions and communities, the recipients were collectively selected by a vote of the entire ADAA membership from a pool of qualifying organizations and institutions. The 60th Anniversary Grants are thus distinct from that of the ADAA Foundation—which was established in 1970 and annually supports fine art museums from across the country with operating budgets under five million dollars.

"While the 60-year mission of the ADAA focuses on advocating for its constituent member galleries and the important work they do for and with artists, it also supports all facets of the art world big and small," says **Executive Director Maureen Bray**. "I'm so pleased that we're able to offer these new gifts that will help individuals gain access to the arts through nonprofit organizations that are making contemporary culture more available to everyone."

In addition to the gift program, the ADAA has created a series of initiatives in celebration of its milestone anniversary. These include an expanded **Relief Fund** for arts and cultural organizations affected by natural disasters across the country, a series of **Member Interviews** that reflect on the history and impact of the ADAA, and a new digital **Membership Directory** that outlines the ADAA's various organizational arms.

The **Relief Fund** was established in 2012 in the wake of Hurricane Sandy and its detrimental impact on art spaces in New York City. While emergency grants totaling half a million dollars were initially provided to ADAA members as well as non-member galleries to mitigate the devastation wrecked by this particular storm, the Fund has since expanded to serve any and all arts and culture organizations across the country that are struggling to rebuild and repair their spaces after natural disasters. On the occasion of the **10th anniversary of the Relief Fund**, a new grant request page on the ADAA's website will now make it easier for organizations to request aid as soon as it becomes necessary.

Lucy Mitchell-Innes, former ADAA President, comments: "When Hurricane Sandy devastated New York, it was an extraordinary moment in which the arts community came together. Ten years later, we're thrilled to re-engage the Relief Fund, and make the application process accessible on the ADAA website, that will enable any U.S. based arts organization in need of aid. The impact of climate change on small businesses is dire, and we must continue to work together to support the arts and one another."

In the **Member Interview Series**, ADAA members reflect on what it means to be a dealer, and what it means to be a part of this historic Association. The videos shed light on the ways in which the art world has changed since the ADAA's founding in 1962, the work of running a small business, and the joy of seeing artists' careers thrive. These engaging interviews provide rare insights into the often mysterious mechanisms of the art market and its leaders. As **P.P.O.W co-founder Wendy Olsoff** explains, "a gallery's relationship with an artist is that they're there for that artist in good times and bad times. Galleries historicize the work, they research the work, and they also build an artist's career." **Leon Tovar** adds, "as an art dealer, as a gallerist, we have a responsibility for life." While this project complements the ADAA's ongoing written interview series, **Gallery Chat**, it remains distinct and will take the form of a video archive—excerpts from which are available on the ADAA's website.

A new digital version of the 2022 **Membership Directory** provides further details about the history of the ADAA on the occasion of its 60th anniversary. **ADAA President Anthony Meier** says: "Each member is exemplary in their own regional communities as well as nationally, through the exhibitions they mount, the artists and collections they represent, and their contributions to scholarship, institutions, and artistic production As innovators in the field, ADAA members spur the creative economy and contribute to the vitality of their communities."

Founded in 2000, Arts of Life is guided by a progressive vision to put inclusivity and creativity first in support of adult artists with developmental and intellectual disabilities. Arts of Life currently serves over 60

artists across Chicago-land. Work by Arts of Life artists has been featured in prestigious venues throughout the world, including EXPO Chicago, Art on the MART, Chicago Cultural Center, Carl Hammer Gallery, the Ukrainian Institute of Modern Art, and INTUIT Center for Outsider Art in Chicago, IL; John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington D.C.; Outsider Art Fair in New York, NY, and the Museum of Everything in London, UK.
